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I hope that you and your families are keeping safe and well, we send our best wishes.

At the moment, I have no news as to when School will be opening for all children, but look forward to the news from the Government and the plans for reopening soon.

I fully appreciate how tricky Remote Learning is for some families. All of our families are in different positions, and trying to cater for everyone's needs is very difficult to perform.

Remote Learning

Well done to all of the children with their remote learning. Everyone is trying really hard and I have been very impressed with some of the work that the children have uploaded onto the eSchool learning platform.

Live Lessons

I have received one or two emails from parents concerning Live Lessons, and questioning why our school cannot provide them throughout the day. We continually review what we can effectively provide here from our school and try to balance this with the teaching commitments our staff have

Most schools in Lincolnshire have less than 20% of their roll on-site as keyworkers. We are currently running with over 35% of our school having keyworker places. This has created a high number of children in classes. Balancing these high numbers with remote learning is very challenging. Teachers are currently teaching close to their normal hours in class. We also have a number of staff shielding, therefore, their roles within school are having to be picked up by other members of staff.

We did trial Live lessons by placing a laptop in front of the teacher during lessons. However, with the other children in the class, and the teacher moving around the class, this did not work. Not only did the teacher not appear on the users screen, but the user could not hear the teacher nor see what was on the whiteboard.

Additionally, the amount of families who are struggling with limited ICT hardware, and several children makes it difficult to provide live lessons. Some families with secondary school children and primary children have real pressures on computer availability within the home. With a shared device, we have to appreciate that some families with 3 or 4 children may have to attend 3 or 4 Teams registrations in the morning, and these cannot be conducted at the same times. Some families are also struggling with wifi connectivity or their internet drops in and out.

There is no Government directive to ensure there are Live lessons. Schools are allowed to provided pre-recorded lessons, using White Rose maths, Oak Academy or BBC Bitesize. Mrs Clark and I are continually monitoring the Live Registrations and lesson summary's in the mornings. It has been lovely to see the children's work that they have been sharing during these sessions. Thank you to the parents who have written to school stating how useful these sessions have been.

I appreciate the position we are in is difficult. It is tricky in different ways for different families, whether it be financial, remote learning, well-being or even the loss off a loved one. A big thank you to all of the parents who have emailed their support for the online Remote Learning we are providing.

Reading Books Online.

We are currently looking into an online reading book platform to help with reading at home.

If your child is absent

Keyworkers

Keyworker documentation for after half-term will be coming out shortly.

If you are a Keyworker, and you are working from home and are able to look after your children at home, then they should be at home.

Covid-19 Testing for Staff

From this week, the Government are providing COVID-19 tests known as a 'lateral flow device' tests for all school staff.

Along with the other protective measures we are taking, testing of staff will allow us to take further measures to help pupils and staff to remain in school. Up to one third of people who have coronavirus are asymptomatic. By testing we will help to reduce the spread in school through asymptomatic transmission.

Staff who have opted-in will undertake two lateral device tests per week.

If a staff member tests positive on a lateral flow device, it may result in us having to close a bubble. The staff member will then take a further 'PCR test' to confirm the result. If the PCR test returns a positive result they will have to continue to self-isolate and follow the guidance from NHS Test and Trace. If the PCR test returns a negative result, then the isolation period ends upon confirmation from Lincolnshire Public Health and the member of staff and bubble can return to school.

Crazy Hair Day

Coronavirus

The main symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19) are:

- a high temperature this means you feel hot to touch on your chest or back (you do not need to measure your temperature)
- a new, continuous cough this means coughing a lot for more than an hour, or 3 or more coughing episodes in 24 hours (if you usually have a cough, it may be worse than usual)
- a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste this means you've noticed you cannot smell or taste anything, or things smell or taste different to normal

If you have any of these symptoms, get a test to check if you have coronavirus and stay at home until you get your result.

If you move house please ensure that you update the school office immediately in order to keep our records accurate.



Tell a trusted adult if something or someone ever makes you feel upset, worried or confused. This could be if you or someone you know is being bullied online.
