Drawing, painting and sculpture: to explore their ideas and imagination by creating drawings, paintings and sculptures; to explore creating designs and artwork on a range of scales.
Exploring techniques: to explore a range of techniques to draw, paint, print and sculpt to help them create artwork.
Comparing and evaluating work: recognising and exploring the colour, patterns and shapes in other artist's work; expressing opinions and feelings in response to their own art work and other artist's work; sharing their work with other people, talking about what they have created.

12. Can I use lines in my painting that are sometimes stark and cold and at other times warm to reflect different features or intentions?
13. Evaluate your work and that of your peers and answer the Big Question: How can you use watercolour techniques to create light and dark in your artwork? How am I developing a painting style of my own?
